

RegenQuest Grand Opening

On June 4, RegenQuest had a grand opening party for everyone to be a part of the ribbon-cutting ceremony and to find out what they had to offer. They are a center for advanced hyperbaric medicine, wound care and offer supportive nutritional advice.

“We handle people who have had concussions, strokes, Alzheimer’s disease, PTSD and more. We have professional

athletes who have come to us... all under one roof,” said CEO James Patrick.

He and his wife, Donna, founded the parent company, CūtiCare, which has 20 clinics in 11 states in the U.S. They are hospital affiliated, but RegenQuest is the first standalone location, although they are looking to add others. Bison Capital is their financial equity partner.

“Healthcare is moving from hospital-based to a community-centric model. We are all outpatient,” he said.

“We make sure [a patient’s] nutrition is optimal. If they are malnourished, it can delay healing,” said Administrator Ashley Raley, ARNP, who added their prices are less than hospitals and they take most insurances. People may need a doctor referral. Hospitals may not even treat patients because some of these treatments are not approved by insur-

ance, which is why a center like this is advantageous.

She added that most treatments in the hyperbaric chamber run 80 to 120 minutes each and people may do 20-40 visits or more.

She said they treat Diabetics, people with radiation, injury to bone or soft tissue, non-healing wounds, people who have had a hemological-stroke, concussion or traumatic brain injury and more.

Hope Fine, RRT-CHT, said, “We have been treating this guy in his 30s who had a brain bleed. He had two Masters ... But when he came to us he wasn’t able to dress himself, feed himself, wake himself up... He is about to finish 60 treatments. When I asked him to change, he would spend five minutes sitting and then would put the gown on over his clothes. Then, he would be naked in the room. Now, he does it [properly]. He is able to sign his name and even put the date and wakes himself up by himself. He can now go to bathroom by himself.”

She said they also help people with Autism, which she says is a “wound in the brain.”

“Kids come to us who don’t speak, can’t dress themselves ... It all starts to improve. They have good eye contact ...” said Fine.

She operated the South Florida Center for Hope in this same location for almost 18 years. By becoming RegenQuest, they are able to incorporate more intensive wound care. She is now a professional liaison for them.

“The care here is more intimate. We are a small knit team,” said Raley, who added the hyperbaric chamber they utilize is the Perry Hard-Sided 40 in. chamber, which is the largest in the industry, which is best for those who may have an issue with being claustrophobic or are larger in size.
